"THE TRUTH" A Star Is Born In New Psychological Thriller *REVIEW*

"THE TRUTH" starring John Heard (Jonathan Davenport), Brendan Sexton III (Gabriel Doyle), Erin Cardillo (Dana Davenport), Daniel Baldwin (Gabriel's father) was sneak previewed as a work-in-progress at the Boston Film Festival last week.

The premise, according to "THE TRUTH" homepage, is "When a successful couple is taken hostage in their upscale home by a violent intruder, a simple robbery turns into a night of secrets revealed and trusts betrayed". More than that can not be revealed without giving away the twists and turns which make the film engaging. Suffice it to say that it is a classic psychological thriller. Among other elements of this genre is the reliance on the psychological tension between captor and captive. However, this film takes it up a notch, and the psychological tension is between the two captives as well as between their captor and them. "THE TRUTH" brings a realistic exploration of relationships and identity which questions how well anyone knows anyone else. It is not a film of speculation and rumination on the part of the characters. Its appeal is partly due to the unspoken angst of this nightmarish situation, which is hidden in the recesses of many peoples psyches. The one on screen spins almost predictably completely out-of-control only to pull the viewer in an unexpectedly different direction. There are raw moments of criminally-sadistic behavior which may be off-putting, but "THE TRUTH" is a truly engaging Pandora's Box of deceptions.

Oddly "THE TRUTH" has a Dogma look and feel at times, though it is a formalist film and could never be categorized as such. This realistic Dogma-like atmosphere is due to Ryan Barton Grimely's (RBG) directorial approach, which causes a feeling of here and now with temporal and geographical realism, and in particular, his stream-of-consciousness pacing. However, it is filmed with lights, props and the blue-hued sharpness of the Red Camera which lends a necessary sensation of cold to "THE TRUTH". There are very clever shots to handle time which RBG employs very successfully; in fact, the entire work is a perfect example of continuity editing which, in an interview, he stated he had a hand in. RBG travels fluidly back and forth between the present and the past in flashbacks which are luminously elegant, not the usual soft-focus fare. He chooses medium and close shots to convey the story, and he shoots entirely within the house, barring the opening scenes. As a result, the home's stark, plain, claustrophobic interior effectively conveys the characters' fears and represents the characters themselves who are held hostage in their shells of personalities as much as they are by their captor. "THE TRUTH" is a very well-calibrated film in every way.

Brendan SextOn III (Boys Don't Cry) as Gabriel Doyle is convincing as a criminal who is neither a madman nor possessed of a mastermind. He is a bit of a street thug who is motivated by revenge as well as the spoils of robbery, a part which could easily have been lost in stereotype; he does not allow that. As expected, veteran actor John Heard (Betrayed, 1988; Mindwalk, 1990; P.J., 2008) as the husband, Jonathan Davenport, also rises to the challenge of duality embedded in his part. He is touching as a pathetic husband in love with his beautiful young wife, but shifts easily to a conniving aggressor.

Then there is the wife who has perhaps the greatest challenge in terms of performance in "THE TRUTH". The actress who takes on this complex character is one who comes under the category of exquisite ice-maiden minx. She has the stunning expressionless beauty of Catherine Denuve or Nicole Kidman and the talent of Meryl Streep. She stands in the ready to take her place on the pedestal of screen star goddess; her name is Erin Cardillo (The Suite Life on Deck). The role of Dana Davenport in "THE TRUTH" demands a full range of emotion and delves into dark, dreary depths not found in the Disney likes of her current starring role as Emma Tutweiller. Surprisingly, Erin, a relative newcomer to features, dug into her training and her soul and proved herself versatile enough to communicate every single one of those feelings with flawless credibility. This is not the last to be heard of Erin Cardillo.
