




BOOKER T. MATTISON is an author and filmmaker who wrote the screenplay for and directed the film adaptation of Zora Neale Hurston's classic story "The Gilded Six Bits," which aired on Showtime. The Hollywood Reporter said of the film that, "Mattison's direction and feel for her characters match up to Hurston's sterling piece of fiction...full of atmosphere and strongly developed characters."

Mattison's second novel *Snitch* received a starred review in *Publishers Weekly* that said, "Author and filmmaker Mattison's sophomore outing reads like its ready for screen adaptation... Mattison has a superb ear and his skills keep on growing."

Mattison's debut novel *Unsigned Hype* was published in 2009 and is in its third printing. Producer Stephanie Allain Bray ("Hustle and Flow," "Black Snake Moan" and the forthcoming "We the Peeples") is attached to produce the film adaptation of *Snitch* and *Unsigned Hype*.

Mattison received his Master of Fine Arts in film from New York University and his Bachelor of Science in mass communication from Norfolk State University. He has taught Literary Criticism at the College of New Rochelle in New York, film production at Brooklyn College and is currently teaching Advanced Directing, Screenwriting and Directing Actors at Regent University in Virginia.

Those who completed the survey have been VWC members for an average of three-five years. Twenty were active members and one was an associate member. They overwhelming said that networking and engaging with other writers was the primary reason they joined the VWC. Other reasons for joining were associated with the VWC being a resource for learning, improving writing skills, finding publishing and marketing opportunities and participating in activities such as workshops and the *Navigating Your Life* Symposium.

These members said that the VWC was doing a good job, but wanted us to do more in the areas of contests, writing events, establishing new Chapters and/or occasional activities in areas of the state where there is no VWC Chapter. They also asked us to find ways the VWC can communicate more frequently with members and to increase their visibility on our website. They felt that we should facilitate Chapter interaction and activities in regional areas. E.g., two or three Chapters holding one writing event. Another member suggested more outreach to aspiring writers and to consider activities aimed at readers – "We need readers to survive." Others asked for new resources, such as a list of Virginia editors and a sharing among the Chapters of proven guest speakers.

Perhaps our most impressive accomplishment goes to the "Navigating Your Life" Symposium. In 2011, it received rave reviews by attendees, and to our delight, it came in under budget. This year's August 4 "Navigating Your Life" Symposium is set to move that bar even higher. The symposium committee, under Betsy Ashton's direction, is bringing together award-winning speakers, practical workshops, great friends and good food in a stimulating networking environment. Mark your calendar now!

I'd like to leave you with a call-to-action quote from noted trial lawyer and author Gerry Spence's book, <u>How to Argue and Win Every Time</u>:

When we engage in the physical act of writing, a connection is struck between the hand and that portion of the brain where our creative powers are stored, so that we are more likely to produce a new idea while we write or type than while we engage in the simple act of thinking alone.








2012 VWC Golden Nib Writing Contest

SUBMIT ENTRIES TO YOUR LOCAL VWC CHAPTER BY THEIR SPECIFIED DEADLINE

Each Chapter has its own guidelines, deadline and membership requirements for entering the Chapter-level contest. All Chapters must adhere to the state contest rules. Some Chapters require membership in their Chapter, some don't.

All entries in the second-tier State VWC contest must be a first-place Chapter-level entry and the entrant must be a State VWC member. If winner at the Chapter-level is not a member of the State VWC, a membership application and payment of dues must accompany the entry.

Contact your local VWC Chapter to find out what the deadline is for Chapter Contest Submissions!

NOTE: Entries sent by writers directly to VWC for State contest will not be accepted.

Each Chapter president is responsible for forwarding only the first-place entries from the Chapter competition (in each of the three categories), written by a member of the VWC ore a writer who completes and application to join the VWC and submits a check for annual dues of \$30 to accompany the entry.

STATE VWC AWARDS: There are nine VWC Chapters in the state. Only first-place winners from the Chapters will be eligible for the state contest. That means only 27 entries will be forwarded for the State competition – nine entries total per category (fiction, nonfiction, poetry) – by the State Deadline of Sept. 3. Winners of State VWC Contest will be announced and awards presented at the State VWC Annual Meeting on NOVEMBER 3. Awards for each category: First Place-\$100; Second Place-\$50; Third Place-\$25.

ABOUT THE CONTEST:

In 2005, the Virginia Writers Club, Inc. created a two-tier writing contest. Entries would be submitted and judged at the VWC Chapter-level first, and then each Chapter would forward its first-place winning entries for judging at the (second tier) State VWC level. Entrants who live within the jurisdiction of a VWC Chapter must enter the first tier of the competition through that Chapter. For those living in an area where no Chapter exists, they must submit their entries to the Chapter closest to them.

CONTEST RULES

Entries will be accepted on any subject the author or poet so chooses, in the categories of Fiction, Nonfiction and Poetry.

- 1. Manuscripts must be the original, unpublished work of the entrant, and must not have won a prize at any level in any other competition. The VWC State competition will now allow entries published in your personal blogs. Writing published in blogs other than your own or on social network sites or in an online publication are ineligible and should not be submitted.
- 2. Entrants may submit only one entry per category of fiction, nonfiction and poetry.
- 3. Fiction and non-fiction entries must be not longer than 3,000 words. Poetry entries must be not longer than 40 lines.

4. Format:

- a. Detachable cover sheet including author's name, address, telephone number, email address (if available), category (fiction, nonfiction, poetry) and title.
- b. All other pages must show contest category, title and page number in the header. If the author's name appears on any page of the manuscript other than the cover sheet, the entry will be disqualified.
- c. Prose (fiction and nonfiction) manuscripts must be printed in a plain and eligible font, such as Times New Roman in 12-to 14-

- pitch. Manuscripts must be printed on 8 ½ by 11-inch white paper, double-spaced, with one-inch margins top, bottom and left, and a ragged right margin.
- d. Poetry manuscripts must be printed in a plain, legible font, such as Times New Roman in 12- to 13-pitch, Manuscripts must be printed on 8 ½ by one-inch margins top and bottom.
- 5. Submissions must include an original and one copy of the manuscript.
- 6. Submissions not in accord with format and other rules will be disqualified.
- 7. State winning entries in each category will be published in Portable Data File (*.pdf) format, on the VWC Web site. All other rights remain the property of the author.
- 8. Manuscripts for the second-tier contest will not be returned.

The presenter was Kathleen Toomey Jabs, who discussed two issues which many writers

struggle: with in the process of deciding how much detail to include when writing fiction informed by the author's real-life experiences, and where and how to best publish your book. Her new novel *Black Wings*, published by Fuze Publishing, is a mystery set at The Naval Academy, in which Bridget, a female midshipmen feels compelled to investigate the death of her roommate, the first female fighter pilot before her plane crashed into the sea. The Navy claims it's an accident, but the facts don't add up. The story is loosely based on Kathleen's experiences as a midshipmen in one of the first classes to admit women at the U.S. Naval Academy of which she is a graduate. She is currently a Captain in the Navy Reserve and holds an MA from the University of New Hampshire and an MFA in Creative Writing from George Mason University. Her stories have been published in a number of literary journals and received several prizes, including selection in the National Public Radio Selected Shorts program

Each reader brings two copies of their work—one to read and the other to project on our overhead projector. We try to get through as many writers' material as possible. Those that are unable to read, go to the first of the list the next week.


Have you been thrilled to see a favorable review on your book listed at Amazon or BarnesandNoble online (or not thrilled to never see one there), or to notice that the "like" numbers mount up on your books listed there, or, at Amazon, to see your book listed in the top 100 of some category? Within your VWC chapters—and soon at the state VWC level—the opportunity readily exists to make that happen. All you have to do is to help each other in the VWC.

Both Amazon and BarnesandNoble online lift your books higher in their "noticed" lists on the basis of the attention the book listing is getting. Part of joining together in writers groups is the opportunity this provides to pool our efforts and help each other in book publicity. The Blue Ridge Writers Chapter has opened an initiative to compile a list of all chapter members' books listed on the two major online distribution sites. This list will then be sent back out to its participating members so that they can help each other by giving reviews, punching the "like" button, and, in Amazon's case, bolstering and expanding the tagging information to lift the book in the distribution site's ratings lists.

Each chapter of the VWC could do so itself within its chapter, and the state level will be compiling and maintaining such a list too—probably on the new state VWC website soon to launch. One of the best ways to get attention for your books is readily available to you through your membership in the VWC—join the synergy by giving attention to the books of others in the club


